

What To Do If You Have Been Declared Bankrupt Against Your Will

People are often surprised that they have been declared bankrupt, even though they have never been to court.

A court can declare anyone bankrupt for owing a debt of £750 or more, if a valid bankruptcy petition has been served (received) and the debtor does not attend the court hearing.

Bankruptcy affects individuals in different ways, often in ways that people have not considered. Sometimes people allow themselves to be declared bankrupt without understanding how it will affect them. It is only when they begin to realise the consequences of bankruptcy that they decide that they must try to have the bankruptcy cancelled.
